

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

ABOUT THE COLLEGE



The College made its humble beginning with 101 students for BA and B.Com programme in 1979 and B.Sc. programme in 1983 to provide horizontal base for general education to both boys and girls. There was no degree college in Channarayapattana till the establishment of our college. The college is affiliated to the **University of Mysore** and has been recognized **under 2(f) and 12 (b) by UGC**. It is one of the two degree colleges in the town, the other one being a Government College. The College is situated in 5 acres campus in the heart of the town. The BA programme started with History, Economics, Political Science and Sociology and optional Kannada in 1984. In 1983 B.Sc. programme started with Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Botany and Zoology. At present the college has more than 1150 students. Over the years the college has earned a name in achieving excellence in the field of higher education. The number of ranks and certificates of merit secured by the students bear the testimony to this fact.

The academic environment of the College is very congenial and healthy. Academic programmes are guided by a team of well qualified, experienced and dedicated UGC and Non-UGC faculty. Sufficient number of class rooms, library, reading room, reference section, sports facilities, computer facilities etc., are provided for the benefit of the students.

Students are motivated through various incentives like scholarships and cash prizes instituted by Government, Private Agencies, Alumni and some faculty members of the college. Further the students (both boys and girls) have excelled in Kabaddi and Volleyball competitions at Regional, University, State and National level. The college encourages sports and games by hosting District Level Malnad Zone Kabaddi and Volleyball tournament every year.

The College brings out the Annual Magazine every year titled "Gari"-The students are encouraged to expose their hidden talents through this publication.

The College has NSS, NCC, Scouts and Guides and Youth Red-Cross Units. The students (both boys and girls) have brought laurels to the college by participating in Republic Day Parade at Delhi and State Level NSS and NCC Camp. The college has Grievance and 'Redressal Cell', 'Placement Cell', 'Women Harassment Cell', and 'Anti-Ragging Cell'.

The Institution has been organizing Health Camps, Blood donation camps and AIDS awareness programmes periodically.



CURRICULAR ASPECTS

enlightened in the orientation programme in this regard. Parents are also enlightened during parents' meeting.

2.1 STUDENT ENROLMENT AND PROFILE:

Although the college is situated in the town area, majority of the students are from the rural areas. Wide publicity is given to attract students from different regions and socio – economic groups besides offering incentives to meritorious students.

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The college ensures publicity and transparency in the admission process through:

Transparency:

Transparency in Admission process is ensured by following the Guidelines of the State Government and University with reference to merit and roaster.

- i) Admission procedure is followed as per the Government reservation order.
- ii) The list of the selected candidates is displayed in the Notice Board along with the waiting list.
- iii) Admissions are made through the scrutiny of Admission Committee.
- iv) Preference will be given to differently abled students.
- i) Preference is also given for outstanding students in Sports, Cultural and other extracurricular activities.



2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. The college has streamlined the admission process in the following manner.

i) Under Graduate Level:

Under Graduate courses in science, arts and commerce are offered by the Institution. After the announcement of PUC results, applications are called for admissions. Applications are issued by taking the prescribed application fee along with prospectus. The applications received are scrutinized, names are short listed based on merit and reservation and final list is announced. In case of more applications for a single course, waiting list also prepared.

The admission committee comprising of teacher from different departments will give necessary guidance and verify the original documents and help in the process of admission. The cut-off percentage for admission at entry level is 35%.

The roaster system is strictly followed at the time of admission.

ii) Post Graduate Level:

Post Graduate Courses in Kannada and Economics is offered by the Institution. 50% of the admission made through CET at the University level and remaining 50% will be filled by Management as per the University Norms.

The admission committee comprising of teacher from different departments will give necessary guidance and verify the original documents and help in the process of admission. The cut-off percentage for admission at entry level is 40%. The roaster system is strictly followed at the time of admission.

The reservation policies of the Government are strictly followed in the admission process.

Women:

More than 50% of the admission aspirants are girls. They are given the due reservation. Efforts are being made to prepare women for their various roles and responsibilities in the ever changing world.

For Disabled/ Economically weaker sections & Minorities:

Seats are reserved as per Government Rules and provisions.

Apart from this the Institution gives fee concession for disabled and the students of weaker sections. If the annual income of the parents is less than Rs. 11,000/- the due reservation is given.

To the minorities the seats are reserved as per the Government rules and regulations.

Any other:

The students who excel in the co-curricular activities like sports, NSS, NCC, Cultural etc., are given special weightage at the time of admissions.

The candidates are given direct admission on the basis of their eligibility criterion as per the University norms and the roaster policy of the Government.

The main reason for the declining trend is the establishment of Government colleges by Government of Karnataka by neighboring areas which is giving stiff competition.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity:

d) Economically weaker sections

Concession in fees and reimbursement of fees is provided to the students belonging to economically weaker section of the society.

e) Sports personnel

Benefit of attendance is extended to the students who participate in University, State and National Level competitions. They have been given special preference at the time of admissions.

b) NSS & Cultural

Benefit of attendance is extended to the students participating in University, State and National Level NSS and Cultural Activities. And special preference will be given at the time of admissions.



c) Special Mention

Ms. Jayashree, one of the NSS volunteers of our college has been selected and participated in the **Republic Day Parade** at New Delhi in 2012.

Mr. Naveen, one of the NCC cadets participated in Republic Day Parade in New Delhi in 2011.

Mr. Vidyadhara, studying in B.Sc. has represented Karnataka team in a cricket match held at Jarkhand.

 In this way the innovative practices are adopted in under graduate and post graduate programmes to enhance the learning ability of the students.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The library caters to the various needs of teachers and students with easy access to books and journals.

Library resources are used to augment teaching and learning process to optimum extent by the concerned effectively.

- The General Library (College and UGC Grants) functions on all days except on Sundays and general holidays with timing from 9am to 6pm.
- The departmental libraries cater to the needs of the teachers and students. The books from the general library as well as departmental libraries are issued to the students. Open access system is introduced to the students of science faculty.
- Books on competitive examinations are also provided to the students.



- The faculty members are given free hand to select the books of their own choice for their respective departments.
- Separate racks are maintained for different categories of books.
- Model question papers, previous year question papers, charts and manuals are issued for the benefit of the students.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges in countered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The college is not facing any serious challenges in the completion of curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar. But only on few occasions owing to unavoidable reasons like strikes and other Government holidays, additional classes are conducted to complete the curriculum.

The institution monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching-learning through IQAC which collects feedback from all stakeholders.

- The quality of teaching and learning are evaluated periodically by encouraging faculty members to attend State, National and International Seminars, Workshops, Orientation programmes.
- Self appraisal report.
- The Principal and the Heads of the Departments monitor the teaching learning process within the class rooms once in a while through observation and interaction with the students.



With this, the performance of the students has increased gradually, which is evident from the examination results constantly maintaining the upward trend.

2.4 Teacher Quality:

 - Recruitments are made as per UGC, State Government guidelines. Preference will be given to Ph.D., M.Phill., in the process of selection.
 - The candidates who appear for the interview are selected based on the marks awarded for:
 - a) Teaching, Learning and evaluation related activities.
 - b) Co-curricular, extension and professional development related activities.
 - c) Research and academic contribution depending on the nature of post.
 - Most of the departments have adequate number of qualified and competent teachers.
 - Guest faculties are appointed whenever needed.

- The college has organized Seminars and Workshops obtaining financial assistance from the Management apart from the UGC Assistance.
- The faculty members are allowed to take up Research work under UGC FIP.
- The college helps teachers in getting the project from UGC. Some proposals have been sent to UGC for Minor Research Projects which are yet to be approved and one minor research programme has been sanctioned.
- Teachers are deputed for Refresher/Orientation Courses conducted by UGC,
 Academic Staff College.
- Leave is granted for further studies/research for the professional growth.

Yes. The feedback from students are analyzed by the committee consisting of the Principal and senior faculty members to improve the quality of teaching learning process.

As the affiliating University prescribes curriculum and evaluation process, the faculty and students are through with the process of evaluation.

The evaluation method will be communicated to the students by issuing prescribed format in an objective type and get the teachers evaluated.

The evaluations method is informed to students during the orientation/Induction Programmes and also in class rooms.

The faculty members educate the stakeholders regarding the evaluation process.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

Evaluation reforms initiated by University:

• Semester system has replaced annual examination method at UG level.

Evaluation reforms initiated by the Institution:

- Periodical tests, assignments, attendance, oral tests are conducted to evaluate the students.
- Assessments of I.A are sent to the University.



• The senior faculty members actively participate in BOS & BOE and hence are a part of the changes resolved by the University.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution ensures effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University and those initiated by the institution on its own through Academic Council and IQAC. The schedule of IA tests is communicated to the faculty and students well in advance. Every department has a faculty in charge of IA test. The marks are displayed on the notice boards. Besides the institution allocates adequate budget for required stationary.

Individual teacher concentrates in the formative assessment continuously and comprehensively by evaluating IA test. At the end of the academic year or before the University examination, a summative evaluation is carried out and every student is thoroughly assessed. A few instances of students getting the coveted University distinction evidence the positive impact of formative and summative assessment.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weight ages assigned for the everall development of students (weight age for

weight ages assigned for the overall development of students (weight age for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

IA tests are conducted on a common schedule for all the students and all invigilators are on vigil, malpractices are totally ruled out, Secrecy of the question paper



is ensured. The marks of the IA test are displayed on the notice boards. Evaluated answer scripts are given to students to make them aware of their mistakes.

Out of 100 marks 20 marks have been set apart for continuous evaluation by the teachers for internal assessment on each paper and the remaining 80 marks by conducting the examination by the University at the end of the semester.

Every teacher ensures that some weightage is given to communication part, independent learning and behavioral aspects.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

Given below are the graduate attributes specified by the college.

- The disciplinary expertise is inculcated by making students the members of the discipline committee.
- The leadership expertise is inculcated by making students members of cultural committee and motivating them to join NCC, NSS, Scouts and Guides and YRC etc.
- Entrepreneurship is encouraged in students through industrial visits and interactive talks delivered by industrialists.
- Research aptitude is inculcated in students by giving them minor projects.

We are sure that the majority of our students gain these qualities when the pass out and become graduates.

At the College Level:

Answer books of IA tests are given and discussed with students and if there is any grievance with reference to evaluation, it is redressed on the spot in the following way.



- Total is checked again

At the university Level:

- University of Mysore has made provision for re-totaling, revaluation, issue of photocopy of answer scripts, paper seeing etc. Since the system of transparency is followed for the semester and evaluation, hardly there are any grievances at college level.
- In case of grievance, with regard to the result the students have the option to approach the University for getting the photo copy of the papers or revaluations.

Yes, the college has clear learning outcomes for its programmes.






- Parents Teachers meetings are held periodically.




As per the schemes and instructions, the expert teachers prepare detailed proposals with the help of other faculty members. Every individual teacher handles a specific area in this regard.
